## September is Fall Prevention

Falls result from an array of causes. More than one in three people age 65 years or older fall each year. Wishful thinking says most falls are not serious and bouncing right back is possible. Reality is that falls break bones, exacerbate underlying conditions, and can leave you flat on your back recovering. Too many FHNN members have reported serious falls this past year. No doubt that many others have fallen and kept that news a secret. Please check out the National Institute on Aging article below about preventing falls and fractures. Look for the three online fall prevention programs from Oasis and Suburban Hospital listed under "Other Village and Local Area Programs." These programs address many fall causes and offer preventative actions to take. Remember that fall prevention knowledge is not enough. Please make an effort to take fall prevention measures and decrease your fall risk!

Author Robert Blaemire discusses his book, *Birch Bayh: Making a Difference*, Thursday, September 8, 1:00-2:30 pm. Former Indiana Senator Birch Bayh was one of the most consequential lawmakers of the 20th Century. He is remembered as the "Father of Title IX" which was a law guaranteeing women access to educational and athletic programs in higher education. To advance important legislation like Civil Rights and the ERA, he worked with allies and adversaries alike. During his 1963-1981 tenure, he fathered two Constitutional Amendments. Author Robert Blaemire began working with Bayh as a college freshman and remained on his staff for 13 years. The two remained friends until Bayh's 2019 passing. This program is a result of a partnership between FHNN, Little Falls Village and the Little Falls Library of Montgomery County Public Libraries and is open to everyone. The Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, *Art, Reason, and Emotion: The Head versus the Heart*, Friday, September 23, 10:30-11:30 am. Philosophers who echo back to the ancient Greeks, have spoken to the age-old conflict of Reason versus Emotion. The conflict faces us regularly in our daily lives. What does art have to say about this conflict? What do the great thinkers have to say? Come discover the connection between the ideas expressed on canvas to thoughts expressed in words. Examples of art from the traditional to more modern will portray individuals faced with the choice: To follow the dictates of reason (the 'head') - or to go with the nearly irresistible compulsion of emotion (the 'heart'). Think of Helen of Troy, Othello, Ahab - even Alexander Hamilton. Thinkers such as Plato, Aristotle, Kant, and Darwin will also be consulted. This historical context includes war, political intrigue, new outlooks on religion, quests for knowledge and freedom,

Congressional Cemetery Docent Tour, Saturday, October 1, 11:00 am to 12:30 pm. Congressional Cemetery at 1801 E Street, Southeast is a 35-acre historic, yet active, burial ground located on Capitol Hill in Washington, DC. Plan to meet at 10:45 am to explore the Cemetery from 11:00 AM to 12:30 PM with a tour guide from the Association for the Preservation of Historic Congressional Cemetery. The cemetery has some main paved walkways, but the ground along the tombstones is uneven. Walking into the cemetery could present a fall risk for those with limited mobility. Outing plans include an optional lunch near Capitol Hill starting around 1:00 pm.

Tour cost is reduced on weekends to \$5 per person. Carpooling spots are available. Family members can be put on a waiting list for remaining tickets. Attendees responsible for ticket, lunch, and transportation costs. Event is part of a collaboration between FHNN and LFV. American Women and the Fight for Equality: 1920-2020, Tuesday September 13, 11:00 am The 19th Amendment was an incomplete victory. Black and white women fought hard for voting rights and doubled the number of eligible voters, but the amendment did not enfranchise all women, or even protect the rights of those women who could vote. A century later, women are still grappling with how to use the vote and their political power to expand civil rights, confront racial violence, improve maternal health, advance educational and employment opportunities, and secure reproductive rights. In her book, Formidable: American Women and the Fight for Equality: 1920-2020, Dr. Elisabeth Griffith recounts the roles of Black and White women as change agents and social justice activists and chronicles their efforts to advance sometimes competing causes.
